2024 Graduation and Passing of the Classes

With the class seated on the graduation stage, the ceremony began with an invocation by class members Elizabeth Doss and Kayrie Manaois. Classmates Fadhila Ashraf and Derrick Miller next welcomed those attending. An annual highlight of Ridgewood graduations is the class account in which they imagine running into each other years later. This year's story had the eight students accidentally meeting in Tokyo at the Baseball World Classic. By the time of this meeting, they have gone on to wonderful careers as doctors, baseball player, lawyer, ballerina, artists, and marketing specialist.

Following the students' presentation, Head of School Aliya Ranginwala and Ridgewood School Board President Afshan Syed awarded diplomas. Mrs.

Summertime at Ridgewood





Our eighth graders learned that a few days in Washington, D.C. are not enough to see all that Washington has to offer. Nevertheless, they immensely enjoyed seeing and learning about the various sites they visited during their eighth-grade trip. Derrick Miller reported that the National

Museum of African American History and Culture "was the BEST museum of the trip." He also, along with the rest of his classmates, ranked the Spy Museum high on his list of favorite sites. For other students, it was the time they spent in Arlington National Cemetery and their visit to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier that they will remember. Avery Radlowski was impressed by the number of items that she discovered in the collection of the Natural History Museum. She especially appreciated the exhibit of gems and crystals. Having studied the Civil War and Reconstruction Era, our students appreciated the significance of Ford's Theatre as the site of President Lincoln's assassination when they visited the theatre. Dr. Angelique Walker-Smith '72 talked with students about writing her latest book, Ahead of Her Time: Pan-African Women of Faith and the Vision of Christian Unity, Mission, and Justice. The book focuses on women from Africa, North America, Latin America, the Caribbean, and Europe who provided local, national, and global ecumenical leadership fostering the modern-day ecumenical movement.

Dr. Walker-Smith engaged the students with her questions that led them through her research and writing processes.

They learned how she determined the

scope of her work, selected its subjects, and conducted her interviews. She also spoke briefly about each of her subjects and their significance. She left students with a sense of the importance of Ridgewood School in her life and encouraged them to make the most of their own Ridgewood educations.

Community Service

Students continued volunteering at local charities including the Second Harvest Food Bank, Project Woman, and the Homeless Shelter. They helped sort donations and distribute items. Students also helped at Empty Bowls (including hosting an event at school that featured ceramic bowls made by 7th graders), Stamp Out Hunger, and Springfield Clean-Up. Students helped renovate and plant a garden for residents at Project Woman. They made stepping-stones for the garden and donated a birdhouse as well. Students delivered handmade bookcases and books to 15 families in the SPARK program and to 2 families at the Project Woman shelter. The bookcase project is in its second year with a goal of promoting reading by providing families with books and a place to keep them. So far, 33 bookcases and hundreds of books have been delivered to families.

Writing: A Ridgewood Tradition



Since its founding in 1919, Ridgewood School has recognized and stressed the importance of writing in its curriculum. Some alumni from the 1960s recall that Head of School Eric Lindblade required seventh and eighth-grade students to submit a 400-word essay every Monday morning. They also remember how they felt while they stood beside him as he graded their papers. Others share that Mrs. Jane Wiley would write a long paragraph on the blackboard omitting

its punctuation and capitalization and have her sixth-grade students rewrite it correctly. Mrs. Wiley awarded students only one of two grades, 100 or 0. If they missed a single error, their grade was zero. Even before Dr. Lindblade and Mrs. Wiley, Ridgewood teachers emphasized writing and high standards for their students' work. One alumna from the 1940s recalled how proud she was of a poem she had written for her teacher Mrs. Violet Turner who had her read it to students in other classrooms. An alumnus who is a professional writer recently praised Mrs. Turner for the extremely high expectations she always had for her students. Today, Ridgewood's teachers continue to emphasize writing and Ridgewood students prove to be among the best writers in regional writing competitions.

In recognition of Ridgewood's tradition of emphasizing writing, one of the display cases in the Pavlatos Atrium is housing an exhibition of the works of some alumni authors. Included in the exhibit are U.S. history books, reference works for educators, law books, scholarly

articles from the fields of psychology, physics, and Chinese penology, along with a history of tennis in North Carolina, art exhibit catalogues and studies, publications about the natural world, scholarly articles about French music and medieval troubadours, and several translations of significant medieval French works. Unfortunately, we could not find a copy of the Broadway play, *Out from Under*, written by Jack Kelly '25.

If you stop in school, take a minute and look at the exhibit containing the work of John Corry '43, Elizabeth Corry Blakemore '45D*, Phillip Trimble '49D, Deborah Hubbard Nelson-Campbell '51, Tim T. Noonan '66D, Angelique Walker-Smith '72D, Caroline Lupfer Kurtz '73, Eric Bauer '87, Elizabeth Reynolds '96, David Pullins '97D, and Toby Smith '97. The variety of the publications illustrates the importance of writing in our world and why Ridgewood continues to emphasize writing in its curriculum.

Would You Like to Donate \$750 to Ridgewood School and It Not Cost You a Cent?

Working through the Ohio Association of Independent Schools (OAIS) and its SGO program (Scholarship Granting Organization), Ridgewood School receives scholarship donations from Ohio residents who designate a portion of their Ohio state tax monies to Ridgewood School. These are dollars that Ohio allows a resident to contribute to a private school of his/her choice, rather than pay to Ohio as income tax. This is not a tax deduction that merely decreases the total income on which a person pays taxes, but a reduction in the total amount of tax dollars a person owes the state. In other words, if you owe \$1,000 in state income tax and make a \$750 donation to Ridgewood through the OAIS program, you will then owe the state only \$250. These donations are limited to \$750 per individual or \$1,500 for a couple who file jointly but make their \$750 donations as individuals. (Please note that should a taxpayer donate more than the

taxpayer's income tax liability, the credit will reduce the taxpayer's liability to zero, but it will not create a refund.)

It's a simple process to support Ridgewood in this way. The process begins with visiting the OAIS website and clicking on Scholarship Granting Organization. Follow the link that you will find there to the one-page donation form. This form will ask if you are an individual or business, your name, address, a phone number, and an email address to which OAIS can send your receipt. You will then choose Ridgewood School from their list of participating schools and enter the amount of your donation. The next step is to indicate whether you are sending a check to OAIS, using a credit card, or debit card and provide the needed information. One step remains and that is to submit your donation. After your payment is processed, you will receive a receipt acknowledging your donation

that you then attach to your Ohio state tax form when you pay your taxes next year. It's really a simple process that takes as little as five minutes!

Last school year was the first year that Ridgewood received scholarship donations via the Ohio Association of Independent Schools. These funds totaled more than \$25,000 and will provide scholarships to students this year. While that is a financial help to Ridgewood families and the school, Ridgewood can use additional scholarship monies. Remember that the dollars you donate are dollars that you would otherwise pay to the state of Ohio.

From the Head of School

It takes a teacher....

Since the founding of Ridgewood School in 1919 there have always been passionate teachers to inspire our students to achieve. It all began when Ms. Winger, who was running a little school out of the basement of a church on High Street, presented her case to a group of local businessmen for her dream school. Her plea was a success as money was collected and construction commenced soon after. Ms. Winger and Mrs. Beard served as Ridgewood's first teachers. Ms. Winger also served as the principal. This was the beginning of the Light of Learning.

After these amazing ladies established the school, Ridgewood continued to attract and retain some remarkable teachers. As it has been documented in our history book, Ridgewood School has

had its struggles over the years. Fortunately, this never stopped the teachers at Ridgewood School from continuing in their efforts to provide the best education for our students. In the 30s and 40s, we had the amazing teacher, Violet Turner, who served as both a 1st grade and 2nd grade teacher and for some time even served as the principal. Some recorded quotes about Mrs. Turner included "I loved her. She taught me to love reading. The day she became my teacher was the best day of my life." Then there was Miss Lucille Jones adored by her kindergarteners. She also produced, managed and directed several Ridgewood performances with other teachers making costumes and sets. I could go on and on about the impactful educators that have walked the halls of Ridgewood School in the past and continue to presently, but that would be a newsletter in itself. My point is to share that it takes a teacher to motivate, inspire, and help students become the adults that they desire to be.

In my experience as a student, teacher, parent and for the past 10 years Head of School, it is a teacher that ignites the light of learning for all children. Without that special teacher to inspire, engage, excite, guide and translate our lessons to life,

learning becomes a burden and at times a challenge we feel we cannot surmount. Our teachers help us to realize we can indeed achieve our goals.

Teachers don't just help us to learn, but the best become our advocates, our cheerleaders of sorts. They are there with words of encouragement and kindness. They help us to find the positive in all that we struggle to accomplish. There are times where they force us to face our reality and push us to go beyond what we think we can accomplish. Though it may seem annoying and painful at the time, ask any alum and they will tell you how grateful they are for that not so pleasant experience of the past.

Ridgewood School's tradition of academic excellence was founded on the beliefs of a small group of parents, community leaders, and teachers who wanted to provide something better for their children. That dream could not have been delivered without extraordinary teachers. As a result, the Board of Trustees have now included in their strategic planning their commitment of supporting all efforts to retain and attract excellent teachers for all future generations of students.
